Welcome to Festival 2023!

We are back for the first festival since 2018! After having to cancel Festival 2020 and 2022 because of Covid, we are thrilled to finally return. For Festival 2023 we're showing 426 artworks by 115 artists. 114 of the artists are women. The World of Threads Festival is a leading international showcase of contemporary fibre and textile art. We're a not-for-profit initiative with charitable status run by a few dedicated volunteers. We believe that some of the most exciting and compelling artwork being made today is happening in the field of fibre arts. In our current age where tech companies would like to replace artists with automated AI generated imagery, making art using fibre and textile methods becomes a *radical gesture*. It's an affirmation of *human* making and creativity. Festival 2023 artists come from Canada, England, Finland, France, Hungary, India, Israel, Mexico, Netherlands, New Zealand, South Korea, Spain, Uruguay, USA, US Virgin Islands and Wales.

Synchronistic Curating

Something that's different about World of Threads Festival is that we let the art guide us. Festival curators Gareth Bate and Dawne Rudman *don't* have predetermined curatorial ideas or impose concepts on the artists. Each new festival is a blank slate. Shows develop entirely out of the submissions we receive. For Festival 2023 we looked through over 3500 images and hundreds of submissions to develop these shows. We looked for connections and common themes. Often artists are on the same wavelength during a particular period. Over time, the exhibition themes emerged and became clear to us. This method has been very successful and has resulted in compelling and unique exhibitions over many years. We are excited to finally share these new shows with you.

We began in Oakville, Ontario in 1994 as a single exhibition. In 1998 it expanded to become a full festival. In 2009 we emerged as an international festival, with artists submitting from around the world. Now, the festival draws visitors from around the region and internationally. Festival 2018 attracted over 60,000 visitors and three-quarters of the participating artists attended in person.














Amorphous

The Gallery

Our major group exhibition is all about abstracted natural elements. The artworks evoke organic things such as plants, leaves, trees, roots, seeds, reefs, rocks, feathers, algae, nests, soil, sediment, clouds and shells. They recall processes like new life, growth and decay. Although they evoke these elements, the artists do so in a non-literal way through *abstraction*. Many of the works are made using repurposed or recycled materials. They are filled with life and vitality. They are amorphous and bursting off the wall as they lunge out towards you. Works range in scale from massive to tiny and use a huge variety of materials and fibre and textile techniques. This exhibition is the spiritual successor to our 2012 show *De rerum natura (On The Nature of Things)*.





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Forever Covid

The Corridor Galleries

This small group exhibition commemorates the Covid-19 pandemic. The lives of everyone in the world were disrupted, and some of us were changed forever. Cities appeared empty as the world ground to a halt. We sheltered in place. Seven million people around the world died. After three years, we now live in different worlds. For many, Covid no longer exists and life went back to "normal". Some still take precautions like masking, and the medically vulnerable continue to isolate. For others it was all a hoax. Most of us took the vaccines, while some refused. What are the long-term effects? Did the world really change, or will the Covid pandemic ultimately disappear from general consciousness like the 1918 pandemic? For some, these lockdown months - or years, were an opportunity for self-reflection. What do I really want from my life? Who do I want to spend time with? Some people changed jobs, learned new skills, or worked from home - for good. Some people were exploited for labour, while others thrived. Imagery and themes in this show include corona viruses, variants of concern, face masks, social distancing, social bubbles, isolation, mass graves and the repetitive days of lockdown. Some artists were productive during the pandemic years and were able to focus on their work. Artists are often guite happy to be alone in a room, but perhaps not that alone.




